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aughter seeps out from under the classroom door. Through the window students can be seen passing themselves through a hula hoop, cleaning out their backpacks, or finding ways to communicate without using words. The teacher asks a question and then sits back and listens as the students respond to her and more importantly, to each other. Discussions on how your memory works, how to take notes, how to concentrate are heard. Small groups go on a scavenger hunt within their textbook focusing their attention on headlines, maps and graphs. This is a typical Learn2Learn classroom where organizational techniques, methods of goal setting, time-management skills, and various study strategies based on learning styles are taught in a fun and relevant manner.

ased around the core belief that students, as life-long learners, need to be taught skills that will help them navigate their path from school-to-career, Orchards developed their Learn2Learn program. This fall we began our 7th year of bringing this twelve session study skills program to middle schools within the metro Detroit area. Through our efforts, over 500 students, 90% from economically challenged families, have been involved in 41 programs in 22 school settings. Orchards understands the vital importance of education to a child's future and our Learn2Learn program showcases our commitment to helping student s develop lifelong positive learning habits.

Expansion of Orchards Programming in the New Fiscal Year

Children's Protective Services worker contacted our Shiawassee County Intensive Family Intervention (IFI) Supervisor and requested services for a family that did not meet eligibility criteria for the program due to the child's age. The IFI Supervisor was required by contract to deny the referral and suggest other community services that might have been able to assist the family.

This one incident and the passion of the Orchards Supervisor has contributed to Orchards expanding our services in Shiawassee County to now include Families First of Michigan, Life Skills, and Families Together Building Solutions. Orchards' expansion to include all three of these programs to our existing continuum in Shiawassee County has assured that we are able to work with all families in need of services designed to increase the safety of children in their own home.

Life Skills, in particular, has allowed us to coach hundreds of families in Genesee, Washtenaw, and Shiawassee Counties on how to develop daily living skills related to nutrition, parenting, environmental safety, and in other areas using positive parenting models which encourage the parent to model the desired behavior.

ur staff, community partners, families, and other stakeholders have identified the many successes related to this service model – this is what motivated Orchards staff to expand our continuum of services in Macomb and Oakland Counties to include the Family Advocate Program and Family Support services respectively, both of which are based on the Life Skills model. We are thrilled to be providing all families, due to the addition of these programs, with an opportunity to learn how to effectively reduce risk using strength based approach so that they feel a greater sense of competence, usefulness, power, and belonging.



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Our Washtenaw County programs have continued to expand over the last five years where we now have approximately fifteen staff servicing five family preservation programs in addition to having more children in foster care visiting their parents.

We recently began facilitating groups of parents and their children working together on family projects such as self expression through the use of art and learning skills to address mutually beneficial topics such as bullying at our Washtenaw office. We are also collaborating with Girls Group to have four of our youth mentored through high school and the college admissions process.

This collaboration with Girls Group, increased staffing through expanded programs and the desire to run groups necessitated our planned move to 1995 Highland Drive, Suite F Ann Arbor, Mi 48108. We have doubled the space we now have available to our programs and staff at this new site. It took some painting and other odd jobs by our staff yet we were able to move on December 11th and we have enjoyed the increased space, additional privacy and ability to engage with our families at a more meaningful level.

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
